

STUDENT ABUSE

Directions: Determine if the following statements are true or false.

1. All school employees, except the administrator, meet the definition of perpetrator under the CPSL.
2. Any child under the age of 18 who is enrolled in a public or private school, intermediate unit or area vocational-technical school can be classified as a student.
3. When a report of suspected student abuse is received by CPS from the parent, CPS should direct the parent to contact the school administrator.
4. If CPS has a contract with a facility and a school employee of that facility is identified as a school employee suspected of student abuse, CPS should conduct a thorough investigation into the matter, prior to filing a report with ChildLine.
5. Administrators should report suspected student abuse to CPS and the police.
6. A child who has multiple bruises as a result of being hit by a school employee is a victim of student abuse.
7. A teacher who is being paid by the parents to tutor their child would be considered a perpetrator, rather than a school employee responsible for student abuse, if that teacher sexually abused the child, while tutoring the child.
8. The interviews of the child shall be conducted jointly by law enforcement, CPS, and the school administrator.
9. If a school employee hits a student in the mouth and knocks out the student's permanent teeth, it could be considered student abuse.
10. A school bus driver isn't considered a school employee.
