<p>A cooperative relationship wherein the Child Welfare Professional enables and supports a client's efforts to make positive changes in behavior and life situation.</p>	<p>A mutual process of gathering pertinent data about family needs, problems, resources, and strengths. Data is used to identify causal and/or contributing factors to family problems and to formulate conclusions about <u>WHY</u> problems exist.</p>	<p>Goals and objectives are statements of desired outcomes. Goals are broad statements of direction. Objectives are concrete, measurable, observable ends designed to reach a goal and eliminate the assessed needs or problems.</p>	<p>The intervention plan lists the necessary tasks and activities to achieve goals and objectives. The plan identifies <u>WHO</u>, should perform the activities, <u>WHERE</u>, <u>HOW</u>, and within what frame. (<u>WHEN</u>).</p>	<p>The implementation of the case plan requires that all parties initiate the agreed upon tasks and activities.</p>	<p>Each component of the plan is reviewed to determine its current relevancy and the success of interventions.</p> <p>Revisions are made as needed. Identification of needed changes prompts a return to the assessment stage, with subsequent resetting of goals and activities.</p>
<p>Casework is dependent upon the existence of a relationship. The client must be <u>engaged</u>.</p>	<p>Assessment provides the rationale for all case goals and plans.</p>	<p>Goals and objectives describe what should be done.</p>	<p>Gives direction to casework activities. The plan should be agreed upon by Child Welfare Professional and client.</p>	<p>The implementation of the task and activities must be monitored and modified as necessary.</p>	<p>Resolution of problems results in termination of casework activities.</p>
